What is the Holocaust Education Institute?

The Anti-Defamation League has expanded its comprehensive Holocaust Education program to bring together:

- Museum-based resources

Session One

Sessions Two through Five

Four after-school sessions throughout the school year at LA's preeminent Holocaust education sites, including a session with a special focus for Catholic school educators

What are the goals of the Institute?

- Introduce educators to an expanded pedagogy for teaching the Holocaust
- Teach effective strategies for Holocaust education
- Provide linkage between the Holocaust and a variety of disciplines
- Meet California state standards
- Create a network with colleagues in the field
- Enable students to explore history through the personal accounts of eyewitnesses

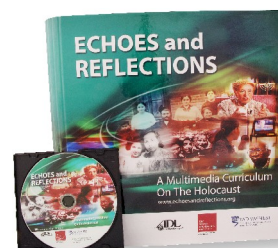
